U.S. Senate

Daniel McCarthy

A Realtor and entrepreneur living in Glendale, McCarthy supports a border wall, calls Obamacare "a complete disaster" and says Arizona should own most of the federal public lands within its boundaries.



Martha McSally*

A former Air Force combat pilot, McSally was appointed to her Senate seat in 2019 and backed several bills related to veterans, healthcare and anti-China issues while sitting on five committees.



Mark Kelly

A retired Navy combat pilot and astronaut, Kelly became politically active after the attempted assassination of his wife, campaigning for gun safety, renewable energy and a strong border.



U.S. House, District 1

Nolan Reidhead

A native of Northern Arizona, Reidhead is a Tucson attorney and touts family values and conservative politics, a border wall, competitive healthcare, gun rights and anti-abortion.



Tiffany Shedd

A resident of Eloy, Shedd previously ran for Congress as an attorney and teacher, and mirrors President Trump in her stand on border security, "job-killing regulations" and abortion.



Tom O'Halleran*

A resident of the Sedona area, O'Halleran is a former police officer and entrepreneur and has campaigned on boosting the middle class, public education and Social Security.



Eva Putzova

A native of Slovakia and an administrator at NAU, Putzova backs Medicare for all, tuition-free college, a Green New Deal, an immigration overhaul and workers' rights.



State Senate, District 11

Vince Leach*

A native of Wisconsin with a background in business management, Leach has been in the Legislature six years and supports border security, Obamacare repeal and business-friendly laws.



JoAnna Mendoza

An Eloy native and a 20-year veteran of the Navy and Marine Corps, Mendoza supports the social programs that helped her family survive and pushes for quality education and rural healthcare.



Linda Patterson

Formerly a teacher, counselor and school administrator, Patterson says its time for a new economy, better middle-class wages, quality education and corporations that "pay their fair share."



State House, District 11 (elect 2)

Mark Finchem*

A Michigan native, Finchem served 21 years in the Kalamazoo Public Safety Department and worked business management in Tucson, touts fiscal responsibility and a free-market economy.



Bret Roberts *

A Maricopa resident, Realtor and former constable, Roberts is seeking his second term supporting a border wall, criminal justice reform, the Second Amendment and "marketplace" education system.



Felipe Perez

A physician originally from Yuma, Perez is campaigning on affordable healthcare, quality education, protecting the environment and providing senior wellness opportunities.



Arizona Corporation Commission (elect 3)

Lea Marquez Peterson*

Appointed in 2019, Peterson is a small-business owner who has pushed for a commitment to have 100% clean energy by 2050 and campaigns on stopping dramatic rate hikes.



Eric Sloan

This is a second try for the commission for Sloan, who had a turbulent campaign in 2018 but is again pushing against increased utility rates and for cutting unnecessary regulations and taxes.



Bill Mundell

A former commissioner, Mundell is running on ethics reform at the ACC and reinvestment in solar and other renewable energy with the goal of having Arizona carbon-neutral by 2050.



Shea Stanfield

A former teacher, Cave Creek Town councilmember and planning commissioner, Stanfield is pushing for oversight responsibilities, sustainable business and renewable energy.



Anna Tovar

A former teacher, Tolleson mayor and state legislator, Tovar says she wants to clean up ACC elections, expand renewable energy and represent taxpayers fairly.



Pinal County Assessor

Mike Cruz

A tax professional for seven years and a school administrator for four, Cruz says he will make assessment more fair, work more with seniors and connect with the community.



Douglas Wolf*

Finishing his second term, Wolf says he wants to help the county continue on its path of growth and follow the law in assessments while improving online access for all.
