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

s Chairman of the Ak-Chin Indian Community, I would like to welcome you to our community and invite you and your family to visit us! Ak-Chin is an O'odham word translated to mean "mouth of the wash" or "place where the wash loses itself in the sand or ground." The Ak-Chin Indian Community has an enrollment of more than 1,300 tribal



members and a land base of just over 22,000 acres. We were formally organized in 1961, under the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934.

First and foremost, we are a farming community; Ak-Chin Farms was established in 1963 and currently harvests more than 15,000 acres, making us one of the largest farming communities in the United States. Cotton is the principal crop while barley, potatoes, alfalfa and corn are also grown. We are home to the Ak-Chin Him Dak Eco-Museum, the first of its kind in the country. The Him-Dak Eco-Museum is a place where objects of our past, our culture and traditions are conserved and shared.

Our local deli, Vekol Market serves as a gas station and cafe that offers a variety of options made fresh daily, a wide selection of groceries, a dining area and a patio with outside seating.

Ak-Chin Southern Dunes Golf Club, located along Highway 238, provides a welcoming ambiance with breathtaking views. Ak-Chin Southern Dunes is perfect for the golf enthusiast but also offers delicious meals at the Arroyo Grille. 
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Maricopa Historical Society



aricopa has had three distinct locations, each with its unique history.

Prior to and during the early colonial period, native bands of the Akimel O'odham (Pima) and Pee-Posh (Maricopa) lived in the Valley around the Gila River. Relying on native trails and the "good-natured" tribes in the area, a stagecoach route was established just west of Pima Butte

Along that route south of the Gila River, about eight miles northwest of the current city limits, a relay station was built. Settlers called the stop Maricopa Wells after the O'odham word for the Pee-Posh people. A steady supply of fresh water made it a desert oasis fed by wells reaching into the underground Gila River.

connecting Tucson with Phoenix.

When Arizona became a territory in 1863, there were only three communities in the state with considerable size – Tucson, Prescott and Maricopa Wells.

Prior to the construction of the Southern Pacific Railroad, Maricopa Wells was a major supply post on the Transcontinental Mail Line and Butterfield Overland Stage Mail Line. Upon completion of the SPRR in 1879, the post was moved south to meet the tracks at its second home – Maricopaville – about 3.5 miles west of its current location.

Maricopaville suffered a short life, lasting only about seven years before being moved to its third and final locale. There were intentions to build a second rail line to connect Maricopaville to Phoenix (M&P Branch Line), but residents in Tempe became upset by the prospect of being excluded from access to the north-south line. In 1886, their noise eventually forced the M&P Branch terminus (Maricopa Junction) east to where the city of Maricopa is today.

In 1887, the first M&P train went into operation, and a year later the Maricopa post office opened.

Shortly after Maricopa found its new home, Maricopaville succumbed to the flames of a destructive fire, taking most of its buildings and homes, and sending its few inhabitants east to Maricopa Junction.

During the next 35 years, Maricopa Junction experienced modest prosperity building churches, a hotel and schoolhouse.

In 1912, under President Taft, the federal government established reservation land south of Maricopa Junction. Less than a year later the federal government shrunk the reservation by half due to opposition from area farmers. Ak-Chin Indian Community was established in 1961.

The population of Maricopa in 1920 was 381. In 1930, in the first year of the Great Depression, that number was reduced to 143. Later, in 1935, the M&P Line closed. Over the following decade, the area struggled with the effects of the Depression and then a wartime economy.

After World War II, the community began to again experience modest growth, even expanding the schoolhouse to accommodate the growing population. Over the next 60 years, some of the most well-known Maricopa families – Smiths, Farrells, Andersons and Burks – moved to the community and established their roots.

In 1995, State Route 347 was finished, paralleling the old M&P Branch Line. The City of Maricopa officially incorporated in 2003.

In less than 15 years, Maricopa's population grew from just over 1,000 to more than 43,000 in 2010. Today, the population is close to 70,000.

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
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The Maricopa Museum and Visitor Center opened in October 2022 with a wealth of historical information and displays about the area.

# WWIII-era Air Force barracks fitting museum home for city on the move

aricopa regards itself as a 21stcentury city on the move. Actually, it has been on the move since the middle of the 19th century, when its hub settlements made a series of short moves to its current site.

So, perhaps it is fitting its first museum also has covered some ground.

The Maricopa Museum and Visitor Center, operated by the Maricopa Historical Society, opened in October at 44240 W. Maricopa-Casa Grande Highway. It is housed in former barracks that in the 1940s was part of Williams Field, an Air Force installation in Chandler where pilots were trained for World War II.

"We procured the building in 1987 when they were getting ready to close the base, and moved it here," said Paul Shirk, president of the Maricopa Historical Society.

Initially, the building was the city library. It later became a veterans center. Now, it is loaded with information and memorabilia, including a big dose from John Wayne's

connection to the area, that tells of Maricopa's journey from Maricopa Wells to Maricopaville to Maricopa Junction, which was the place now known as Maricopa.

The city's past is full of colorful lore. Perry Williams, the first mayor, albeit self-proclaimed long, long before Maricopa was incorporated (in 2003), had a pet bobcat he paraded around town on a leash.

"It's just a joy bringing all this stuff together so people can understand Maricopa was a happenin' place," Shirk said. "We want to continue to tell that story."

Shirk's pride and joy is a scale replica of the Maricopa and Phoenix Railroad Station, from which trains made their first journey to Phoenix in 1887. Fire destroyed it in 1931. Originally a school project, the replica was dilapidated and falling apart when Shirk got his hands on it, he said

"I got in touch with Southern Pacific and got their book that gave the exact colors and the way the wood was, vertical and horizontal, and



I re-created this station," he said. "I did this with all balsa wood and a laser, so it made an exact replica of the depot. Just a few days ago, we got these photos of the locomotives that ran from here to Phoenix. These are really rare.

"At the time, Maricopa was even being considered for the state capital, so this depot they built was considerably larger than the one in Phoenix. Isn't that cool?"

It took Shirk and other members of the historical society years to find items for the

"I am a researcher by trade, and I keep going," he said. "Just (in early October), we were not getting a lot of information on Maricopaville because it was only there a few years."

Maricopaville moved after seven years when it was learned the junction of the Southern Pacific and the Maricopa and Phoenix lines was going to be a few miles away, so the settlement moved to what was then called Maricopa Junction, now Maricopa.

"I was interested in the old Maricopaville station, so I dug until I found a Southern Pacific person who gave me a blueprint of it, and then they said, 'Did you know that Maricopaville station was taken apart and moved to Los Banos, California?' I said, you're kidding," Shirk said. "They moved it on flatcars 750 miles. I contacted the Los Banos Historical Society and got a picture of that reconstructed depot."

While the building has history of its own, there's much more inside, with concentration on the three places that have been Maricopa in

"People always ask a lot of questions about that, because even people living in the area don't always know that history, and how that came about," Shirk said.

"But the railroad was the driving force of all



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# How Mike Ingram brought together the building blocks of Maricopa

ike Ingram is not crazy or stupid. That may be obvious to observers now, but 25 years ago, many of Arizona's most knowledgeable movers and shakers thought he was nuts. Now the chairman of El Dorado Holdings, which he founded in 1992, Ingram became one of the most influential people forming the modern history of Maricopa.

After creating Rancho El Dorado and sister subdivisions The Villages and the Lakes, El Dorado Holdings still has thousands of acres in and around Maricopa set for residential and commercial development. It has thousands more acres in other communities it is also developing.

But Maricopa continues to be Ingram's baby. The work has been a combination of puzzle pieces and chess moves to find the right combination of partners and investors in what others thought was a hair-brained scheme.

"I had this vision and plan for a new city there," said Ingram, 78, "At the time, we had entitlements through Pinal County. There was no city of Maricopa. Maricopa was less than 500 people."

partner Marty Ortman, with whom he purchased El Dorado, a ranch formerly belonging to John Wayne near Stanfield. That gave their fledgling company its name. Then they purchased other farms in the vicinity in 1992 and became known to other landowners.

He still clearly remembers the day Karl Eller called and asked him to lunch at Phoenix Country Club. The late Eller was an advertising mogul and John Wayne fan, who had purchased the Red River Ranch in 1980 from the late actor's estate.



Developer Mike Ingram ignored skepticism and followed his vision for Maricopa.

"I need you to think about buying the Red His first deal in real estate was with River from me," Eller told Ingram. "But I need you to close it in a week."

> Eller had a loan with a local savings-andloan company that had collapsed and been taken over by the U.S. government. He made a deal with Resolution Trust Company, the government's asset-management company, to pay off the loan. Time was running short. He offered Ingram a fair price.

"So, we bought the Red River in '92." Ingram said. "I had a love for John Wayne my whole life. When we bought El Dorado Ranch, I was real excited to be a part of that deal,

the Louis Johnson and John Wayne history behind it and what that means to the whole community down there. And preserving that history, you just don't have any idea what that means to me."

When El Dorado Holdings had Red River in escrow, Ingram received a call from Louis Johnson, Wayne's long-time business partner in Maricopa, whose property was in the middle of Red River. Johnson said he wanted to be a partner in Ingram's real estate plans and set him up with Willard Sparks, one of the largest commodity traders in the nation.

Another partner, Dr. James Little, became one of Ingram's best friends.

#### IT STARTED WITH A ROAD

When Ingram began buying farmland around Maricopa, some residents thought he could be key to solving a serious problem: Maricopa Road. Community leaders like Alma Farrell, Jane Askew and Ann Donithan were hosting meetings in their homes to get property owners on board with widening the deadly, two-lane strip.

Leading farmers Bill Scott and John Smith reached out to Ingram, getting the ball rolling for the Maricopa Road Association.

"He recognized that we needed to have a four-lane highway coming out here," Smith said. "So, we got together and posted a bond issue. We knew that the county wouldn't help finance it. So, we voted on it, and it just barely passed."

In 1989, Arizona Department of Transportation was ready to accept the road if the association could raise half the money.

"The citizens of western Pinal County all had a big, big part in making that happen," Ingram said, "Alma Farrell was a big part of that. She had many, many meetings, actually gave me a place at Headquarters to work out of in those days. In a room between the bar and the restaurant, that was my little office there in Maricopa. And we went to work on it."

Former U.S. Sen. Dennis DeConcini brought federal money to the table. Pinal and Maricopa counties also came on board. Gila River Indian Community agreed. Property owners around Maricopa voted to tax themselves for the improvement district.

"Mike worked hard, a lot harder than I did,"

In tragic irony, Jane Askew, who had been a passionate voice in widening the dangerous roadway, was killed in a crash on that very road in 1990. The main park in Rancho El Dorado is named in her honor.



The widening of the section of Maricopa Road, newly named State Route 347, to two lanes in each direction was completed in 1996.

Despite naysayers calling it a road to nowhere, Ingram knew it was vital to his plans. He started piecing together his properties, buying farmland from Smith and others.

#### THE NEED TO BELIEVE

Ingram knew he still needed a powerful real estate broker to bring in homebuilders. Each one he called in Phoenix shot him down, telling him Maricopa would just be a bunch of mobile homes.

"In those days, all the interest was on Casa Grande," he said. "I went to every broker in town and showed them my idea. And every broker except one said, 'Mike, you're absolutely crazy. You'll never sell one lot. You'll never sell one home until Casa Grande is completely built out. Do you not understand that Casa Grande has doctors, they have shopping centers, they have car dealers, they have dentists? You have a Circle K and Headquarters, and NAPA was there."

The one broker who listened was someone Ingram did not want to approach in the first place. James "Nate" Nathan of Nathan & Associates brokered some of the biggest deals in the state, including Johnson Ranch, Power Ranch and Copper Mountain Ranch in Casa Grande. Ingram saw him as a major competitor.

Nathan listened because he saw what Ingram saw: tiny Maricopa's proximity to the Utilities had no interest in coming to Maricopa. East Valley and Sky Harbor.

"You could tell growth patterns," Nathan said. "He said, 'I can't list this with you because you're going to take the people to those other places, I Angeles and Dallas. said, 'No, I'm not. It's an emerging market."

In 2000, Nathan and his partner, David Mullard, took the first phase of 1,000 lots and sold to three homebuilders. It took them just

Nathan said a top selling point was the newly widened road.

"The affordability in the Southeast Valley was going away, just like it is again, and so Maricopa exploded," Nathan said.

Many homebuilders wanted to go cheap, building homes with carports and swamp coolers, roof-mounted air conditioners and composition roofs instead of tile.

"Mike was like, 'No, I'm creating a whole new city."' Nathan said. "We went with the builders that Mike believed would build the quality product that he demanded. He never wavered from that once

Ingram said if he had settled for the county standards, he wouldn't have put in curbs and sidewalks and could have chip-sealed the roads. He said Maricopa would look like Arizona City today. Instead, he wanted standards like those in municipalities like Chandler and Gilbert. At Nathan's insistence, the homebuilders agreed.

Ingram was spending \$14 million on The Duke golf course and another \$3 million on landscaping for phase 1 of Rancho El Dorado and wanted quality homes to go with it. With no impact fees at the time, homebuyers could get an 1,800-square-foot home for what they would pay for a 1,300-square-foot home in Chandler.

The homebuilders were just the first hurdle.

When he had 1,103 lots in escrow with five homebuilders, Ingram went hunting for a water company. He went to Atlanta, Minneapolis, Los

"Nobody would put in a water company or wastewater," he said. "So, we put in the water and the wastewater."

Eventually, Global Water agreed to take over most of Maricopa's water system, inheriting those early lines.

Ingram asked Cox to provide cable service. That was another no-go from a company that did not believe Maricopa would be a success. Then Ingram found Orbitel and talked its principals into being a partner in the venture.

"Orbitel was certainly one my favorite projects of all time," said Rick Anderson, a partner in Orbitel at the time. "Mike's group had a great vision for Maricopa. I have never witnessed anything like growth in the early days of Maricopa."

Anderson said when he was asked to pull something together after Cox passed on the opportunity he was impressed with the developers. Two decades later, Cox finally would come to Maricopa.

"I found the Rancho El Dorado group very straightforward in their approach to forming a partnership that formed the foundation for the success of Orbitel." Anderson said.

President John Schurz said the founders of Orbitel "believed in the city of Maricopa and its residents. There is a 'Can Do' spirit that permeates throughout the community. And, like Mike Ingram, Orbitel saw the potential in

Then Ingram received back-to-back doses of

"The darkest day of my whole life was the day Arizona Public Service told me they wouldn't bring me electricity," he said. "Qwest said they wouldn't bring fiber optics."

Electrical District No. 3 was serving farmers in the area with hydroelectric power. Ingram saw they did not have the capital or the knowhow to bring thousands of homes online. So, he flew to California to convince Edison Power to partner with ED3 on a new utility company.

"About that time, Qwest called after they saw the utility formed, and they said, 'We're on our way with fiber optics," Ingram said.

Looking back, it might have been easy for Ingram to quit trying to open so many closed

"People didn't believe in it. I would go to these meetings at these restaurants, and people would say I was the craziest man in the world," he said. "We built this four-lane divided highway and thought we could build a town down there. I was absolutely the laughingstock of the real estate community."

#### DID YOU KNOW?





John Wayne was born Marion Morrison in Winterset, Iowa.

He grew up in Southern California and became a movie extra and then an actor after losing his scholarship to USC in the 1920s.

Wayne bought 4,000 acres of farmland between Maricopa and Stanfield in the late 1950s.



He partnered with local cotton farmer Louis Johnson, who managed Wayne's farm. The two later merged their properties. Both now have roadways named for them in Maricopa.

Wayne and Johnson moved into the cattle business in the 1960s, running a feedlot near Maricopa and a ranch near Springerville.

One of Wayne's favorite watering holes was Table Top Tavern in Stanfield.

Johnson's wife Alice put Wayne on a weight-loss program for his movie roles.

At the peak of the Wayne and Johnson cattle partnership, they had 85,000 head.





# Wild things

As the weather moderates in Maricopa and Pinal County, the wild animals are sure to become more active. Here's a look at some animals that are common around the city and what to do if you encounter them.

#### **JAVELINAS**

While javelinas look like wild pigs, they are members of the peccary family, a group of hoofed mammals originating from South America. Javelinas are common in much of central and southern Arizona. While javelinas can be somewhat aggressive and damage vegetation, the biggest danger they pose are the other animals they can attract, including wild dogs, coyotes and even mountain lions, as those are animals that prey on javelinas.





#### COYOTES

Coyotes are common in rural and urban areas statewide. They are clever and will take advantage of any food source. Yards with fruit on the ground, pet food and unsecured garbage cans and even pets can attract these wild animals. Coyotes may see larger or loud dogs as a threat to their territory and may lure and attack dogs that are off leash.

WHAT TO DO: If you see a coyote, take notice. Make loud noises. Keep eye contact. Shout and bang pots and pans or rattle empty soda cans with pebbles in them. Do not turn and run away. They may chase you down. Be aggressive. Wave your hands or objects like sticks and brooms. Throw small stones, or if you have it on hand, use mace if you come across a bold animal that refuses to leave.

#### RATTLESNAKES

There are two main varieties of rattlesnakes you are likely to encounter in and around Maricopa. The Western Diamond Backed Rattlesnake and the Sonoran Coral Snake. The Western Diamond Backed snake can get aggressive if angered enough. The Sonoran Coral Snake is very shy but is still highly venomous. Both snakes are attracted by shelter, water and a supply of rodents.



#### **SCORPIONS**

According to the Arizona Poison and Drug Center, there are 30 different species of scorpions in Arizona and only one, the bark scorpion is considered deadly. At full maturity, it's only an inch and half in length. It's small but climbs well. Scorpions are dormant during the day. During the warm months most stings reported to the poison center occur at night.

WHAT TO DO: If you come across a scorpion inside your home, it's time to contact an exterminator and get on a routine maintenance plan. In order to keep them away, make sure your grass is cut short, and keep any trash or debris away from your home. In the off chance you are stung, clean the site with soap and water, and use a cold compress while you position the affected limb into a comfortable position. Most bites can be medicated with an over-the-counter pain reliever.

#### **GILA MONSTER**

The Gila Monster is the largest lizard in the United States, weighing in about 2 pounds and sometimes reaching a length of 20 inches, including its tail. It moves slow and spends most of its time underground. They are most active in the spring. They burrow into the ground during the hottest months of the year but emerge during the rainy season in late July and August.



# Maricopa 2022 real estate market rode a wicked rollercoaster

Phew! Thought it would never get here.
In the past, when people asked

me to describe the Maricopa real estate market in a few words, it was easy.

This past year was different, though, because the market made a huge shift in the

middle of the year from "many buyers, minimal

homes" to "minimal buyers, many homes."

The average selling price for a home in
Maricopa in January 2022 was \$375,000.

Eleven months later, by mid December, the
average selling price was \$372,352, marking

Although the starting numbers and finishing numbers don't show it, Maricopa sales prices rocketed from January to July (\$431,078) and then skidded, creating the rare drop.

the first year-over-year decline in many years.

The Maricopa housing market, mirroring that in the Phoenix metro area, was categorized as a "strong seller's market" for much of 2022 before it was downgraded to a "very slight seller's market" by mid December. We are close to a neutral market, much different from where we were just a year ago.

In 2021, homes were like toilet paper at the beginning of COVID: There was no inventory, and when the buyer found a good-fitting house, they would buy it immediately, sometimes paying a premium.

In 2022, inventory started low.
Throughout the year, it increased at an alarming rate. In mid December, there were approximately 700 homes for sale, roughly double the average Maricopa market normal of 300 to 350 homes.

For sellers, buyers are out there but they have a huge number of homes from which to





choose. The seller's home should show like a model. The home MUST be listed at market price. There is no more listing a home high and then still getting multiple offers. For buyers, depending on the number of days a home has been listed, asking for concessions may be a good move.

As we step through a new door into 2023, what are we leaving behind in Maricopa real estate?

- 1. 2022 had months with the highest inventory of homes for sale since I began tracking in 2006.
- 2. A slowdown of brand-new homes being built did not prevent a huge number to choose from. Many are completed or nearly completed, and may have been started for a different buyer, who never finished the transaction.
- 3. Of the mid-December homes for sale in Maricopa, 265 were brand-new, in process or recently completed.
- After 2021's supply and labor shortages, the supply chain re-opened in 2022 and builders not only completed homes but resumed construction of new ones.
- Mortgage interest rates increased multiple times during the year, causing

people to wait out rate increases that made payments too high, in turn causing some buyers to no longer qualify for their dream home.

6. The highest home-sold prices ever in Maricopa occurred mid year, when a whopping 38 homes sold for more than \$600,000. For perspective, in 2021 there were six that topped \$600,000 and in the years 2003-2020, there were no homes that sold for more than \$600,000.

The forecast for 2023 calls for increased negotiating power for buyers. If the seller is being firm with negotiations, the buyer can focus on another home with 700 homes from which to choose. Among the fastest-selling homes are the larger ones (4-plus bedrooms). Since COVID, the number of people working from home has increased drastically. Many 2or 3-bedroom homes don't leave enough space for a family and an office, or two.


Prices will continue to drop until interest rates drop drastically or the inventory does. Maricopa will continue to grow as more businesses, big and small, come to town.

Most residents don't realize there are 24,932 homes in Maricopa, but developers have land and plans set for another 45,716 homes. That would mean that we are only 36% built out!







# MUSD's higher grades after COVID reflect consistent, purposeful effort

mong the institutions most disrupted by the COVID-19 pandemic was education.

Students were out of classrooms for extended periods. Ostensibly, they were being educated remotely on laptops. But were they? Maricopa Unified School District has a student population comprising a multitude of socio-economic backgrounds. Although the district provided laptops, some homes did not have internet connectivity.

Did students process and retain information remotely to the degree they might in a classroom? If kids were home alone, were they really tuning in to their lessons?

Not only were students out of their element, but so were their teachers, as they learned to administer lessons through an online platform.

There were questions and concerns, but the first letter grades released in the post-pandemic era by the Arizona Department of Education in November suggest Maricopa public schools came through the chaos of the pandemic well.

"We are proud of our letter grades and appreciate the opportunity to report our students' achievements," MUSD Superintendent Dr. Tracey Lopeman said. "Our grades are a result of the purposeful efforts and actions of teachers and principals working with students and families. The A-F letter-grade formula relies mostly on standardized test scores, which do not tell the whole story of student performance and growth. Letter grades are just one of the tools MUSD uses to hold ourselves accountable to our public. That is why we open our doors for tours and invite our community in to see our schools firsthand."

Santa Rosa Elementary improved a full letter grade to an "A" and Pima Butte Elementary maintained its "A" rating.

"Our school was determined to rebound from the unfinished learning during the



pandemic and come back strong," said Santa Rosa principal Eva Safranek. "Every classroom focused on small-group instruction, and our teams monitored progress through benchmarks and formative assessments to determine the next steps for targeted instruction. I couldn't be more proud of the work of Santa Rosa students, teachers, and staff."

Elizabeth Allison, principal at Pima Butte said that her staff "worked tirelessly during the height of the pandemic and afterward to build meaningful relationships with students and families, bridge learning gaps and encourage student academic success."

Arizona law requires the Department of Education, subject to final adoption by the State Board of Education, to develop an annual achievement profile for every public school in the state based on an A through F scale.

The system measures several factors, including year-to-year student academic growth, proficiency on English language arts, math and science, the proficiency and academic growth of English-language learners; indicators elementary students are ready for success in high school and high school students are ready to succeed in a career or higher education and high school graduation rates.

Grades are for the 2021-22 academic year and based on data collected by the state board last spring. The state's 2022 calculation heavily emphasized student growth and recognized the importance of recovering unfinished learning from the pandemic.

Measures implemented by MUSD to bolster academic performance in the wake of the pandemic may have been a factor.

"When measuring success, there are so many different ways," said Sheryl Rednor, MUSD assistant superintendent of academic services. "We're trying to triangulate the data.

"We've really strengthened our preschools, starting with our youngest learners. Preschool is now offered on every single campus. We believe in starting them young and coaching them up from a young age."

MUSD has an elementary-school duallanguage program this year.

"We're also looking at strengthening our families because they are partners in the child's education. Our Board of Education has been very supportive. We're making sure the programs we offer provide as much support as possible, not only for our teachers but also our families. We're seeing growth in our students."

Maricopa voters approved a school-district budget override in November 2021, which keeps class sizes smaller and technology up to date. The district also opened its second high school, Desert Sunrise, this school year. It has programs in place to help students who fell behind during the pandemic. MUSD spent more than \$1.5 million last school year to improve the performance of its certified, classified and administrative staff. A substantial chunk included \$322,000 for phonetics, linguistics, literacy and writing-skills engagement, according to Rednor.

Rednor and her team go into schools and observe classroom activity.

"Last year was tricky for us because we were just coming back from the pandemic," she said. "There was learning loss, like everywhere else in the nation. Everyone has a story. Remember, we had students last year, third graders, who were in their first year of a quote-unquote regular year in a classroom. Our youngest learners weren't in brick-and-mortar schools for a period of time.

"We saw kids who were fine, and kids who weren't fine. So, I don't want to make a blanket statement that because they lost those years, they were unsuccessful, because many were."

The high scores among MUSD's elementary schools seem to reflect the district's emphasis on starting with its youngest learners in several initiatives.

"What we looked at last year, our first year back for the most part, with our youngest learners was phonetic instruction, building a solid foundation in K through 2," Rednor said. "Without that, they can't read. It's very

"Reading and writing are super important," Rednor said. "Consistency, repetition, familiarity are so important. When you compare this past year to 2018, it's just a whole different story. We're really proud of the work happening here."

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

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

species, season and method-of-take, so do your research with the Arizona Game and Fish Department and Bureau of Land Management.

When properly licensed and permitted, hunters in the monument could have access to iavelina, mule deer, mountain lions, dove and quail. Desert bighorn sheep are also known to live in the Maricopa Mountains, though due to dwindling populations, permits to hunt these illusive mammals have become harder to obtain, with only 80 to 100 being awarded in the state each year through the AZGFD's lottery system.

#### **Box Canyon Shooting Range**

North Hidden Valley Road (scheduled to open early 2023)

About 10 miles west of town, the 68-acre facility is within the Box Canyon Recreation Area. It will accommodate as many as 90 shooters

#### Maricopa Shooting Range

Hidden Valley Road

Located on Hidden Valley Road, approximately 1.25 miles south of Farrell Road, is Maricopa's closest public shooting area. Situated on the eastern slopes of the Palo Verde Mountains, this target-shooting area is open and free to shooters of all ages and types.

The secluded site is managed by the Bureau of Land Management, which requires target materials, ammunition casings and all other garbage be disposed of properly. Individuals caught littering may be prosecuted.

#### **Sonoran Desert National Monument**

Most of the Sonoran Desert Nation Monument is open for recreational shooting. with the exception of 10,600 acres in the north and northeastern areas that in 2015 closed to target shooting because of a court-ordered analysis of the impacts of such shooting on the Monument. The prohibited areas amount to only about 2 percent of the total monument.

The Bureau of Land Management advises all shooters to follow safety guidelines and only use firearms as prescribed by federal and state law, BLM also requires target materials, ammunition casings and all other garbage be disposed of properly.

#### **CAMPING & HIKING**



# Fentanyl overdoses wreak havoc on Maricopa families

HE DAY MARICOPA RESIDENT LISA TYLER FOUND HER SON UNRESPONSIVE IN his bed was a devastating heartache she wishes on no one.

"This is my son," Tyler said, holding an urn. "His name is Tyler (Champagne); he was 27 years old."

Lisa Tyler was at an August City Council for the proclamation of Aug. 21 as National Fentanyl Prevention and Awareness Day in Maricopa. She wanted to help create awareness "because I don't want anybody to have the pain that I go through."

"I found my son on May 10 at 3 p.m. in his bed," Tyler said. "If you guys don't educate yourselves and your family, you'll either be at a cemetery or you'll be holding an urn at the funeral."

Tyler's son died of a fentanyl overdose, an all-too-common occurrence in Pinal County, Sheriff Mark Lamb explained at the same event.

"My heart goes out to the Tylers for the loss of their son Tyler Champagne," Lamb said. "This is happening way too often. What do I say as a sheriff when I show up at their house, or what does the (Maricopa police) chief say when he shows up at their house?"

Lamb said Pinal County typically has about 750 overdoses a year and the number is growing. He refers to those incidents as "poisonings." Lamb said in Arizona, 33 children have died of fentanyl this year, seven of them under the age of 1.

Tyler spoke of the destructive nature of her son's death.

"I was the first one to hold him, and I was the last one," she said. "He'll never get a chance to marry, have children, finish school. His life was ended that quick, and in the meantime, it destroyed my whole family. My kids will never have the parents back that they had, my husband will never have his wife back. So just please, please, please, pay attention. These social media (sites), they literally deliver it right to their door, and they use emojis on Snapchat."

The drug was originally developed by pharmaceutical companies for pain medication in cancer patients. It was mainly applied with the use of a patch on the skin.

Due to its powerful effects, it's often added to heroin and other drugs to increase potency.

In many cases, overdose deaths occur when users believe they are purchasing heroin and have no idea it's fentanyl.

Lucinda Boyd, co-founder of local nonprofit The Streets Don't Love You Back, said use of the drug is reaching epidemic proportions.

"Fentanyl is the single deadliest drug threat our nation has ever encountered," she said. "Fentanyl is everywhere. From large metropolitan areas to rural America, no community is safe from this poison. We must take every opportunity to spread the word to prevent fentanyl-related poisoning and overdose deaths from claiming scores of American lives every day. We must stop the stigma, the stereotype, the drug user assumptions and

misconceptions that fentanyl poisonings occur only with addicted users. Anyone can die; most are not drug addicts.

"Fentanyl poisoning is real, and our children are dying."

#### **Spreading awareness**

Lamb explained the problem needs attention and should be at the front of everyone's mind.

"When this becomes the leading cause of death in America, with over 100,000 lives lost in a year, it should be on the front page of every newspaper, on every news station and every politician's mouth, but unfortunately, it's not. It's going unspoken of, and it's left for us to clean up the mess."





Exceptional Community Hospital opens Fast Track ER

F YOU ARE HEADED TO THE EMERGENCY ROOM,

chances are, you need attention in a hurry.

Well, at Exceptional Community Hospital, that won't be a problem as the facility opened its Fast

Track emergency room over the summer.

The project itself was on a fast track and was completed less than eight months after the hospital's opening in December of 2021.

The new emergency room is designed to reduce wait times and will be available Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Exceptional Community Hospital, 19060 N. John Wayne Pkwy., is committed to concierge care, which includes minimal to no wait times for patients.

The new emergency room was another step for Maricopa's first hospital.

At the end of 2c21, ECH-Maricopa's 2c,coc-square-foot Phase 1 debuted with a state-of-the-art facility that includes a specialty internal-medicine hospital; digital imaging suite, including CT Scan, X-Ray, mobile MRI and ultrasound; in-house laboratory as well as outpatient and inpatient hospital beds for acute admissions and overnight observation of patients.

Additionally, in partnership with higher-level hospitals in the Phoenix area, Exceptional Community Hospital features a landing area for air ambulances to ensure the fastest transfer of patients needing a higher level of care.

The ceremonial ribboncutting at Exceptional Community Hospital-Maricopa earlier this year ushered in more than a new era for the city with its first hospital. It provided a glimpse into the future growth of that hospital.

#### More to come

According to Saeed Mahboubi, CEO of Exceptional Health Care, even with those capabilities, the



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

community is ready for more services, and Exceptional is preparing to provide them.

"Phase 2 will be just north of the existing building and will include additional rooms attached to the hospital — mostly in-patient rooms and emergency department," Mahboubi said. "That's where we're lacking space. So, we'll have more rooms, and Phase 2 also will include an

OB/GYN department. Then Phase 3 will be surgery and medical office space."

The Phase 2 and 3 expansion is on top of an already-announced expansion of services within the existing hospital walls.

Exceptional began its initial expansion just weeks after opening its doors. That expansion, into a space left vacant by design so the hospital could react to the specific needs of the community, will help the hospital implement its "Fast Track" care option that will help the ED reduce wait times and lighten the patient load in the triage area.

"Although we have been open only a few weeks, we saw an opportunity to improve efficiency and care inside the Emergency Department," Mahboubi said when the initial expansion was announced. "This will not only

speed up the time it takes for patients to be treated, but also improve care times for our more critical patients."

The hospital already is proving to be a huge benefit to all parts of the community. Robert Miguel, Chairman of the Ak-Chin Community, said a hospital was long overdue.

"Finally," Miguel said. "I mean, really, finally, I was born and raised here before we had anything up and to finally have a facility to care for not only Maricopa but also Ak-Chin has been much needed for a long time, so this is definitely a dream come true for the citizens of Maricopa and the members of Ak-Chin."

#### All plans are welcome

Mahboubi said Exceptional Community Hospital-Maricopa accepts all insurance plans.

"Exceptional Community Hospital—Maricopa honors all in-network benefits for emergency services provided to our patients," he said. "We bill in-network copayments, deductibles and coinsurance. We accept all commercial insurance plans and any Medicare, Medicaid (ACCCHS), TriCare plans and HIS/Tribal and VA plans. **Exceptional Community Hospital-**Maricopa is state licensed but is pending Medicare certification. Once Medicare is certified we will bill for services after the Medicare participation date. Medicare, Medicaid and TriCare services will not be billed to insurance or the patient prior to Medicare certification."

The new hospital is situated in the heart of Maricopa on State Route 347 at the south end of the overpass. The 20,000-squarefoot, state-of-the-art facility includes nine in-patient rooms and eight emergency room treatment rooms allowing those sick or injured in town to receive emergency treatment without a half hour hospital ride to Chandler or Casa Grande.

Mahboubi said insurance network status should not affect the hospital's ability to provide care to anyone who needs it.

"We do not balance bill patients for any amounts in excess of in-network benefit patient costs, thus network status with health plans should not hinder access to emergency care for any insured community member," he said. "We appreciate people choosing Exceptional Community Hospital in Maricopa, and we are dedicated to providing expert medical care for the entire community and all those patients in need."

#### Award-winning care

This year, Exceptional Community Hospital earned The Joint Commission's Gold Seal of Approval® for Hospital Accreditation by demonstrating continuous compliance with its performance standards. 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## Quest to look best, feel best drives Maricopa Wellness' dynamic owner

HE'S A MOM TO TWO YOUNG CHILDREN, A WIFE, a business owner, a national trainer for a medical device — which requires frequent travel — and as of August a holder of a doctorate degree obtained in 13 months in a program that typically requires 18 to 24 months.

She's been wired for success since she was a little girl, growing up in a home with a pair of entrepreneurial parents who've owned several businesses. It's no surprise, then, that Kristina Donnay is a high achiever.

Donnay founded Maricopa Wellness Center in 2019 after obtaining an associate degree in nursing from Central Arizona College, then bachelor's and master's degrees from Arizona State University and Grand Canyon University, respectively She capped it in August with her doctorate as a family nurse practitioner from Chatham University in Pittsburgh.

"She just doesn't sit still," said Debi Sovis, Donnay's friend, client and hairdresser. "She's incapable of relaxing."

Bill Day, who, with his wife Levina, is approaching two decades as a Maricopa resident. recalls the day in 2018 their daughter approached them about going into business together.

"And I'm literally, 'No — but tell me more," Day recalled.

Donnay then laid out her plans for what would become Maricopa Wellness that Donnay and her husband Chris and her parents now own at 41600 W. Smith Enke Road, Building 14,

But there is no question the dynamo behind it all is Donnay

"I saw that Maricopa didn't have a facility like this," she said. "It can be so beneficial, but because it is a cashbased business, we've seen in Chandler and Phoenix too many practices like this opening with maybe not the best values and I didn't want it to get a bad name. So, I wanted to open one here first before anybody else to prevent the city from seeing these services in a negative light."

As a cash business, Maricopa Wellness cannot accept insurance, according to Donnay, although patients can submit to their insurance on their own for possible reimbursement. The center is not a primary-care provider but a med spa, a hybrid of an aesthetic medical center and day spa that provides nonsurgical aesthetic medical services — Botox injections, chemical peels and hormone injections and other treatments — under the supervision of a

licensed medical practitioner.

"We started April of 2019, and we did not have our first client," Day said. "We literally went into this with just our positive attitude. The last time one of our email campaigns went out, I believe we had about 1,200 active clients."

By the end of its first year, the high-tech facility offering cutting-edge treatments with state-of-the-art, FDA-approved equipment, was named the Maricopa Chamber of Commerce Small Business of the Year and Best New Med Spa in the Southwest, and on its way to great things.

And then came the COVID-19 pandemic.

"You know, that wasn't in our business plan," Donnay, 39, said with a laugh. "My dad and I put together different business plans: If this happens, if a recession happens, how are we going to deviate, grow and change? A pandemic was not part of that planning."

And the pandemic wasn't particularly small-business friendly.

Donnay, the medical director, and Day, the office manager, were forced to shut down. but they made the decision to continue paying their employees.

"And this was before any of the COVID-relief programs, PPP and those things," Day said.

Consequently, Maricopa Wellness re-emerged with

essentially its entire crew intact, "but, looking back, we probably came closer than we would have liked" to not making it through, according to Donnay.

During the time it was precluded from rendering its usual services, the center was the first in Maricopa to offer COVID-19 testing and among the first to offer the Johnson & Johnson vaccine until it could reopen for aesthetic treatments.

"Honestly, it's been difficult. We saw a lot of clients suddenly move, and not just move into Chandler or Tempe but move out of state without warning," Donnay said. "The pandemic definitely threw a wrench into

Prior to COVID, a box of gloves cost Donnay \$5. After COVID, the price jumped to \$25-\$30. Paper sheets to cover beds that had cost 2 cents before COVID, skyrocketed to 50 cents each.

"So, finding supplies alcohol, wipes, disinfectant, gloves, masks, you name it, the list goes on and on — it's still a struggle," she said. "During this whole process, I've really tried to not raise my prices. We've taken a huge hit on those profit margins, mainly because, in my head, I keep thinking, 'Well, it's got to get better."

The clients are coming back, and Sovis said Donnay's approach is among the reasons.

"First, her knowledge base is off the chart," Sovis said.



"She's way too smart for her own self. She has such a great way of explaining things that you completely understand it. She doesn't give you false expectations, either."

Day recalls a story illustrating his daughter's determination. She was turning 16.

"We bought her a car, a little VW Cabriolet, and it was so funny because Kristina didn't know we had bought it, and we parked it in the driveway," Day said. "I had the keys, and we gave her a book, "How to Win Friends and Influence People." I told her she had to read that book before she was going to get the keys. You should have seen the look on her face. And I told her not only do you have to read it, because I've read it multiple times, but I'm going to ask you questions to make sure you've actually read the book.

"She did it. I think she really learned and has taken that through. My wife and I owned a dog-grooming and pet store in the '70s, owned five bridal shops, I owned a trash-hauling company in Phoenix. Kristina's always seen my wife and I, our drive, so she's been around it all of her life."


#### **Building a reputation**

There are no secrets about the mission of Maricopa Wellness: Donnay wants clients to look good and feel good.

Men and women are treated. The profile of an average client is age 35 through 55, working-class adults with children and family, wanting to live their healthiest life, Donnay said.

Bio-identical hormones — or hormone replacement — is the most popular service.

"By the time somebody comes to see me, they've spent a lot of money, probably, seeing other

"I want to provide people with that win. I want to provide people with the safe, effective treatment that makes a positive difference in their lives."

Maricopa Wellness owns four state-of-the-art, InMode

aesthetic lasers, on which Donnay not only is highly trained but flies around the country training others on their use.

"Education and training help me provide the best services safely and effectively," she said. "We're top of the line, cutting edge. We're using the newest technology. I have invested in science behind everything. I am extremely diligent. Any treatment we offer, any product we offer, has to have significant research and science behind what I'm recommending.

"I hope I'm good at or explaining why it's really safe. "I

Some of our machines are the first aesthetic lasers to have artificial intelligence and so it's regulating the temperature at 1,000 times a second, making it extremely safe. These aren't the old lasers that caused a lot of down time and difficulty recovering and look scary. These aren't that."

Day said his daughter's status as a national trainer for InMode is a great benefit for Maricopa Wellness by her knowing and implementing the latest procedures and how to get the best results.

"That's really put us on the map nationally," Day said.
"We have people that come from California, Utah, and the farthest we've ever had was someone from New York to have procedures done here at the spa.

"We've had many people come into our facility tell us, 'This is so nice, you could be in Scottsdale.' That's what we want to promote. Kristina and I both feel Maricopa people deserve just as good, if not better, service than they get in Scottsdale. We want to provide the quality services for people so they don't have to fight the (State Route) 347 traffic to go into town for procedures."

The Days as well as Sovis and her husband Richard, a cardiac nurse with Banner Health, all are on hormone-replacement therapy at Maricopa Wellness.

"When I first started coming in, I was just looking for amazing facials," Sovis said. "Then I did hormone replacement. My husband and I both do that. It's life-changing."

Day, 64, echoed Sovis' assessment.

"We're finally taking vacation time together," Donnay said. "It's been really difficult managing being a mom, being a wife, being a business owner, provider, national trainer and getting a doctorate. It's been quite a year.

"I'm excited to take a couple of days of quality time with my family."

That brought a chuckle to Sovis.

"I'll believe that when I see it," she said.





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## Is my relationship toxic?

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE (AKA INTIMATE partner violence, dating abuse or relationship abuse) is defined as a pattern of behaviors used by one partner to maintain power and control over another partner with whom they are in an intimate relationship. DV does not discriminate against age, race, gender, sexuality, religion, education level or economic status. It can include a variety of behaviors to include physical, sexual, emotional and mental harm.

Whenever one is starting a new relationship, it can be hard to see what the future may hold. Dating, in essence, is like trying on new clothes. We must see what works and what doesn't before we make the final decision to continue long term. At the start of a relationship, it usually is impossible to see whether someone will later become abusive. This is known as the "honeymoon" stage

of a relationship and usually everything is going great. The partner presents as an "ideal partner" and someone you'd most likely want to continue dating.

As the relationship grows, there can be red flags, or signs, that your partner is trying to assert their power and control. You may dismiss it at times. They may apologize profusely and swear it will never happen





again, and you may just be so head-over-heels for them that you just don't want to see the signs that are there. The abusive traits can start to intensify as the relationship continues to grow, but again, it doesn't happen overnight and usually the abusive partner does well with convincing you "things aren't that bad" or "it's your fault."

DV revolves around power and control. The abusive partner uses a variety of tactics to keep their partner from not only leaving them but from telling anyone about the abuse. Over time, the abuse generally becomes more intense, more violent and more frequent. For a breakdown of some of the most common tactics, refer to the Power and Control Wheel created by the Domestic Abuse Intervention Project.

If you ever find yourself in a situation where there is abuse present, it may seem impossible to get help or get

out. The most important thing to remember is that you are never to blame for the actions of your partner or others. You can create a plan to keep yourself and your children safe as you work toward a long-term plan to get out of the relationship. There are advocates and hotlines that can be of help in guiding you. Your local victim's advocacy center can direct you to shelters and other points of contact. If you are in therapy, you can inform your therapist, who can work to help you stay safe and find resources. It will most likely not be easy, but it can be done and there are many people willing and wanting to help you. Once you have realized you deserve better and want a change, you have taken the biggest step toward a happier and safer life. 🗓
