





orn with a heart defect that caused him two heart attacks before his 36th birthday, Derrick Warford wants to spread wellness among the youth — physically, mentally and behaviorally.

A social services technician and one-time professional football player, Warford is an assistant football coach at Maricopa High School and heads AZ Elite Athletics Wellness Services (AZEA) to provide training and resources for school-age athletes.

"I've always been training athletes," he said. Wellness is usually top of mind for him personally. He has known since he was a child his condition would get chancy as he got older. He never let the issue keep him away from athletics or his mission to prepare kids for life.

This month, AZEA is hosting a "Wellness Tour" at Maricopa High School's Ram Stadium. Warford said the expo is focused on mindfulness and wellness. Whether teen players come to him to find a way to use athletics to gain an education or a career or just physical discipline, he wants them to learn young the consequences of decisions they make.

The June 24 event is planned to have four major components. A "Wellness Fest" and community market will have community businesses, vendors, organizations and clubs

along with artists and musicians providing resources. A "Youth Engagement Zone" is an active area with games, bounce houses, arts and crafts, raffles and special guests. The free Athletic Skills Camp is for boys and girls age 8-12 who want a try at circuit training, speed drills and a combine course.

A main draw is a "Prove It" 7-on-7 football passing tournament and team combine, featuring varsity and junior varsity players from Maricopa and surrounding communities. Team entry is \$175.

Warford said proceeds will benefit Be Awesome Youth Coalition, The Streets Don't Love You Back, Maricopa Rams and Hope for Kids.

He likes to instill "the power of athletic thoughts" through constant repetition and self-awareness. When a student quits or rages or makes another bad decision, he walks them through the process of evaluating their own reaction.

"I say, 'Ask yourself what was your trigger. What was that moment?" he said.

A native of Macon, Georgia, Warford played football at Alabama State University. Undrafted after graduation, he signed as a free agent with the Tennessee Titans in 2006. A preseason knee injury hastened his departure from the pro ranks.

He moved to Arizona in 2008. Soured a bit on football, he worked with at-risk youth in his social services capacity. He started AZEA in 2009, building more relationships with youths and Valley coaches. Warford got married and moved to Maricopa the same year, 2014. When he heard MHS was looking for volunteers in its basketball program, he reached out, flirting with the idea of coaching the freshmen.

That position was already filled, however.

"But they knew about my football background, and [Athletic Director Mark] Cisterna caught me on a good day and asked me about the football team," Warford said.

"He kind of fell into our laps," said Rams head coach Chris McDonald, who brought him in as a defensive line coach.

Warford said it didn't take long for the football "bug" to take hold again. "The freshmen bought into me because of the NFL thing," he said.

At the end of the year, McDonald sat him down and offered him the job of defensive coordinator.

"He's very demanding but respectful," McDonald said. "He's really good with the kids."

Warford and his wife Raven both deal with medical challenges, he with his heart and she with epilepsy. Never again wanting to have to drive himself to the hospital in the middle of a heart attack, he worked to lose weight and control his blood pressure. The goal-setting he preaches to the kids is still getting a workout in his own life.

■ heryl Ortiz has come through a difficult year and emerged as a strong single mother and a mother-figure to hundreds. Now she can officially claim the title of "Best Mom

The mother of Caleb, age 11, Adelina, 8, and Elijah, 4, Ortiz is a first-grade teacher said. "She has such a kind and giving heart at Legacy Traditional School. She estimates she has taught more than 300 students in her 11 years on the job, the last four at Legacy. The mother of one of those former students, Barbie Samsel, has become a close friend who nominated Ortiz for InMaricopa's "Best Mom" contest.



"She has been through so much and her faith in God has never wavered, and her love for her children knows no bounds," Samsel not only to her own children but also to the children she cares for everyday in her firstgrade classroom."

Ortiz said she was "totally blown away" when her nomination received the most Facebook "likes" of 19 nominees.

"I feel undeserving and so humble," she said. "There are a million and one wonderful mothers in Maricopa."

A serious domestic violence situation upended the lives of the Ortiz family this year. She said they were instantly embraced by Against Abuse. The community also encircled them, reaching out to help, often in anonymous ways as she helped her children adjust to a "new normal." The children were "adopted" for Christmas, and cards with cash were left to help through the holidays.

The community support was clear in the nomination post as parent after parent called her "amazing."



John Wayne at 110: Man meets myth in Maricopa

efore Maricopa was a city, it was a tiny town in the Wild West. In fact, its history spans nearly 150 years prior to its incorporation in 2003. Split down the middle by railroad, Maricopa was inhabited by farmers, cowboys and a Native American tribe.

It seemed to be the real-life snapshot of a scene depicted in so many Hollywood western movies. Perhaps that's one reason John Wayne spent many years here away from the spotlight.

Wayne's presence in Maricopa began over 60 years ago when he bought nearby farmland. He later partnered with local farmer Louis Johnson, and together they cultivated cotton and cattle.

The 110th anniversary of Wayne's birth (as Marion Morrison) was May 26. The impact he left in the community is still displayed throughout the city. A drive through Maricopa's main street, John Wayne Parkway, and a round of golf at "The Duke" at Rancho El Dorado is evidence of the city's romance with the star's namesake.

Despite local landmarks named after Wayne, many dispute the legitimacy of his spending time here — often chalking it up to urban legend.

"I've heard people say it was just a hoax," said Maricopa's first mayor and lifelong resident, Edward Farrell.

But he knows that's not true. As a child, Farrell met Wayne inside his family's restaurant on multiple occasions.

"There were times he'd stop at Headquarters for a cocktail and my dad would call my mom

and say 'John Wayne's here having a drink. Bring the kids," he said.

Farrell's family still owns and manages the mid-century-style restaurant and bar that received a name change in the 1990s as "The New HO"

Hanging on a wall is a black-and-white they would cook them in there."

On the second floor inside E

Wayne made brief stops inside the establishment for drinks during his business trips away from the silver screen.

It was an experience the then 4-year-old Farrell couldn't appreciate at the time.

"Now I've watched all his movies. He's this big, tough cowboy who kills everybody, but he wasn't anything like that. He was a very nice, cordial gentleman," he remembered.

During dove-hunting season in September, HQ owner Alma Farrell said Wayne and his entourage filled a round table in the back of the diner after mornings spent shooting. Some notable friends who joined him were WWII Marine Corps fighter ace Joe Foss and baseball player Jay Hanna "Dizzy" Dean.

Alma laughed at the doubts some hold as

to whether Wayne dined there.

"Too bad you weren't here to see it," she joked.

During dove season's fortnight, Wayne and friends rose early before daybreak to hunt. Once they reached their 10-dove limit, they brought the birds to Headquarters.

"We used to have different health regulations then," Alma recalled. "They would get together in the back of the restaurant and they would clean the doves, and that's why we have that barbecue pit in the clubroom because they would cook them in there."

On the second floor inside Edward's home is the round oak table Wayne and his friends dined over and played poker around during Headquarters' heyday.

As the story goes, Wayne, distracted by his card game and fueled by cocktails, would set his lit cigarette on the edge of the table, letting it burn to its end. The practice eventually stained the edge of the wood, leaving behind permanent, vertical streaks.

The famous cowboy left his mark on Maricopa in more ways than one, and Edward Farrell said it's one more bit of Maricopa's legacy that should be preserved.

"I think it's very important that we keep those roots in our history and know where Maricopa's coming from — not just where it's going," he said.





Now is the time of the year when many of the fruits and vegetables growing in our yards are starting to ripen. There is nothing tastier than a fresh tomato picked right off the vine or a juicy peach just plucked from your backyard tree. But how do you know when your homegrown food is ready to harvest? Let's find out!

Apples - The fruit is ready when it can be easily separated from the tree.

Beans (Snap) – For best flavor pick when pods are thinner than a pencil and seeds are tender but not fully formed.

Cantaloupe – The rind should be tan, not green, between the netting. The melon will readily release from the plant when you see a crack around the base of the fruit stem.

Corn (Sweet) - Harvest when silk tips are brown and ears feel firm. Pierce a kernel with your fingernail; if the juice is milky, the ear is ready to pick.

Cucumber - For pickling, sweets can be harvested when 11/2 to 2 inches long and dills when 3 to 4 inches long. For fresh slicing cukes, pick when 7 to 9 inches long and bright, dark green in color.

Eggplant - These are ready when the fruit is firm and bright in color. Cut with 1 inch of the stem attached.

Grapes – The best indicators of ripeness are color and taste. Grapes must completely ripen on the vine to achieve maximum sweetness before picking them.

Peaches, Nectarines - These should be allowed to ripen fully on the tree. When the skin of the fruit is the expected color and the fruit easily separates from the stem, it's ready.

Pears - Pears are ready to pick when the green color lightens and the stem parts easily from the spur, but they should still be hard. Pears ripen best off the tree. They are ready to eat when the stem end of the fruit yields slightly to pressure.

Peppers - Green bells will be firm to the touch when ready. Sweet peppers will turn

from green to red, yellow, orange, chocolate brown or purple when they are ripe. For best

> flavor, hot peppers should be allowed to ripen fully on the plant before harvesting.

Summer Squash - The best flavor and texture for zucchini are obtained when they are harvested at about 4-8 inches long and about 11/2 inches in diameter. Scallops are best enjoyed when they are about 3-4

inches in size when picked.

Tomatoes – Harvest these when they have fully changed color to red with the slightest touch of softness. However, they will continue to ripen after picking if they are harvested when

Watermelon – These lovelies are ready to pick when the curly tendrils are dry and brown and the skin of the fruit is no longer shiny, but

dull. The bottom of the fruit (resting on the soil) will change from light green to cream or yellow

Did you know most vegetables should be harvested early in the morning when their water content is highest? Corn, however, should be picked later in the afternoon when the sugar content is at its peak.

Watch for the ripening treasures in your garden. Harvest them, clean them, store them properly (a topic for another time), and enjoy them at their best.

City analyzes 3 keys to boost economic development

As the city approaches its 14th birthday, officials are reaching for the stars, hoping Maricopa's growth will not only accelerate but also happen in a sustainable fashion.

To achieve this, the city has engaged with a third-party consultant, IO.INC, to assess the city's economic fortitude to ensure future development parallels the city's 2040 Strategic Plan.

At a City Council retreat May 9, representatives from IO.INC joined department heads, the mayor and city council to discuss their assessment and offer suggested plans of action to boost economic growth.

IO.INC's president and chief strategist Ioanna Morfessis laid out the Economic Development Strategy for Maricopa she said was based largely on an analysis of "Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats," or SWOT.

IO.INC offered remedies, which echo the Strategic Plan, emphasizing three key objectives: improving city customer service to better support businesses, maintaining the assisted growth and sustainability and providing educational opportunities.

Customer Service

The city made it a point in the Strategic Plan to assist businesses of all sizes looking to open in Maricopa. Unfortunately, Morfessis' assessment found some businesses license applicants were dissatisfied.

City Councilmember Vincent Manfredi

said things are inherently easier for bigger businesses. Those with legal help know how to navigate the licensing and permitting process, he said, whereas smaller businesses that lack legal assistance have little idea of the process.

"Economic Development should hold their hands," Manfredi said.

After a couple of anecdotes of bad customer service experiences, Development Services Director Martin Scribner said he was not aware of any such incidents, or he would have corrected them.

As much as he would like to help everyone, he said, some people just don't get it. For some of these businesses, he said, "it's not just holding their hand, it's breast feeding."

Continuing the metaphor, Scribner said "sometimes they just don't take."

Sustainability

Trying to avoid any potential boom-andbust scenarios, the city has made multiple efforts to invest in long-term developments for both small business and the larger lightindustrial sectors.

These efforts are apparent chiefly in the project at Estrella Gin Business Park and in the city's support of the Maricopa Center for Entrepreneurship, neither of which has seen

At the April 18 City Council meeting, MCE Director Quintin Baker provided an update of his efforts, which seemed to be more nuanced than precisely measurable. Since joining the organization in November, Baker believes he has made improvements in the review process and in tracking growth of client businesses.

Baker has not, however, been able to provide specific client growth data, nor has he been able to provide details regarding MCE distribution of small business loans funded by the federal M-Loan program issued via the city.

To the former, Baker said they are helping businesses develop systems to track their growth. Baker said the M-Loans are simply "being reviewed."

Aside from a lack of concrete assessment, Councilmember Peg Chapados indicated further concern she had with MCE considering neither Baker nor any representative from the organization was present at the City Council retreat.

Baker said he wasn't made aware of the

Education

The demographic study conducted by IO.INC indicated around 37 percent of Maricopa residents possessed a higher education of two years or more. This fact, Morfessis said, is a good sign for businesses looking at Maricopa.

"If we can get them here, we have a qualified workforce," Morfessis said.

Knowing considerable growth occurs around industries not dependent on college degrees, Mayor Christian Price suggested an emphasis on vocational and entrepreneurial training is equally important.

Utilizing a collaboration between local businesses, high schools and community colleges, he said, is just as important as having a high average of bachelor's degrees.

Also, Morfessis said the city is seen by some as having a "love affair with charter schools."

She claims this can be seen as a positive attribute when drawing in businesses with employees concerned about school choice, or a negative attribute as some view that support comes at the expense of the local public schools, a factor that could drive potential industries



Flood Plain

A fourth obstacle mentioned at the meeting which, aside from string-pulling, the city has little recourse to correct — was the flood plain.

Much of Maricopa's undeveloped land lies in that flood plain. For the past several months the city has been awaiting a final adjusted analysis of Maricopa's flood risk under the Federal Emergency Management Agency's risk assessment.

If the Army Corps of Engineers and FEMA deliver new higher flow rates, which the city believes they will, Maricopa will have to reassess their flood mitigation plan. That

included channelizing the flood plain for a heavier flow. These efforts could double or triple the cost of the mitigation plan.

Morfessis and most city officials present concurred this reassessment is one of Maricopa's greatest issues at hand.

"We have to solve this flood-plain problem," Morfessis said.

Crossing his fingers, Price said the city might have people close to President Trump who may be able to help.

Morfessis said, "That's great; maybe we can Trumpify it."



A mechanical engineer by trade, Aragon uses couture fashion to capture ideas predominantly influenced by the pottery




Maricopa Ace leads state in Children's **Miracle Network fund-raiser**

Health inspectors ding 3 eateries

At Good Donuts a refrigerator was keeping food items at 43 degrees instead of the required 41 degrees or cooler. Inspectors also requested an organized cleaning schedule. At Cilantro's on refrigerator had items as high as 51 degrees, and temperature logs were recommended. At Plaza Bonita, some items in the refrigerator were at 46-51 degrees and some food items were not properly date marked.



Beef straight from the ranch

Ajas grow traditional business with modern marketing

hen Bass Aja married Anna Groseta in 2009, it was a binding of two ranching families with near iconic status among Arizona cattlemen. They were from farm people who went back generations, even to the Old World — the Ajas from Spain and the Grosetas from Croatia.

Both families started in mutton and then shifted to beef.

Now in the Maricopa area, Bass and Anna have turned into beef entrepreneurs, starting the 9F Cattle Company. The focus of the business is delivering fresh beef straight from the ranch.

"It's a rich history for both of us," Anna Aja said. "My grandpa was born in Middle Verde, and he and his father would, by wagon, take up meat and produce to the miners in Jerome. My grandmother was born and raised in Jerome and they'd meet up there when they would go and take meat and produce."

That is a tradition that is being reimagined for the 21st century with the 9F Cattle Company. Direct-from-the-ranch beef sales is something Anna always wanted to try.

"There's a lot of people I've seen try to sell direct, and they sell for a while and then they don't. It either works or it doesn't," she said. "I thought, 'What does it hurt? Might as well try it."

Cattle the Ajas raise on Groseta and Aja ranches are an Angus cross called Balancer and mostly grass-fed. They primarily use a butcher in Tucson connected to the University of Arizona food laboratory. The beef is dry-aged up to 21 days and then frozen for delivery. The Ajas also have beef on hand, renting commercial freezer space in Mesa.

"People want to know who's raising their beef and who's raising their food," Anna said. "It's not for everyone. The price point's not for everyone, and that's totally fine. Really I just want people to eat beef and enjoy it."

Customers can buy 10 pounds of ground beef at \$6 per pound or a 400-pound full beef with everything at \$9 per pound. Delivery is free to customers in Maricopa or to anyone who orders 300 pounds or more. Anna said she would eventually like to sell direct to restaurants.

"If I can provide the connection for someone to know us and know our family and know where it was raised, whether it was south of Buckeye or in Cottonwood, and what it ate and the kind of life that it lived, I really enjoy that," Anna said.

With parental support for the venture, Anna Aja set up a website and got the business moving last year when she was in the late stages of pregnancy with her third child. While on maternity leave, she took Anna and Bass Aja raise an Angus cross called Balance, with the meat harvested in Tucson and personally delivered. Right, the Ajas with their children Bassie, Andy and Perry.

newborn Perry with her as she picked up beef orders in Tucson and drove them to customers.

Much of the marketing has been on social media because she has not had time to work farmer's markets yet. So far, her time and resources for getting the word out have been limited, but she wants to build it beyond a home-based hobby.

"I do a lot of focused, targeted ads on Facebook, and then word-of-mouth," she said. "We also targeted foodies and insta-blogger people and offered free beef and asked them, if they like it, to talk about it."

One-on-one conversations have been very fruitful, as well.

She met Kristen Lee of Phoenix at a communal summer-table dinner.

"We started talking about our passion for food and how much I enjoy knowing where my food comes from," Lee said.

After learning about the Ajas' 9F beef, which sounded exactly like what she was looking for, Lee put in an order.

"Buying in bulk, it was more economical than I thought it would be," she said. "I really enjoyed it. It has a much beefier flavor. It's leaner. You can actually taste the meat."

She said she likes knowing the cattle are humanely raised with no hormones or additives. She also likes helping out a small business.

Cortney Tyler was one of several gym-mates in Maricopa who became Anna Aja customers.

"I never bought meat directly from a rancher. We only had store-bought meat," Tyler said. "My husband was saying, 'This is going to be a waste of money.' But it was amazing to taste the difference. The meat was really, really good."

She praised every cut in the 10-15-pound variety pack, from ground beef to tenderloin.

"We'll definitely be ordering again. I have a family of five, so it doesn't last that long," she said.

The Ajas also are a family of five. Bassie is 5, daughter Andy is 3 and Perry is 1. They are growing up rural like their parents did. The Ajas spent early May moving into their new home between Maricopa and Stanfield.

"I grew up helping on the ranch and showing in 4H and FFA," Anna

Aja said. "I had my own little flock of sheep and showed steers and enjoyed doing that as I grew up."

Her parents, Andy and Mary Beth Groseta, own the W Dart Ranch in Yavapai County. Anna is a fourth-generation ranch girl and still has cattle on the W Dart.

Bass (Basilio) Aja's great-grandparents came to the United States as sheepherders, working and saving to own their own ranches.

"So I grew up mostly in sheep and transitioned to ranches and cattle,"

His mother's family settled Perry Mesa, which bears their name. Bass grew up in Buckeye. The family ranch was south of Wickenburg and another ranch was near Joseph City.

Bass and Anna, both 32, first met at an Arizona Junior Livestock Association gathering during an Arizona Cattlegrowers Convention when they were 15. That was little more than an introduction because they lived so far apart, but they discovered each other again while attending the University of Arizona. Her friend was his roommate, who reintroduced them.

After marrying, they lived in Welton, near Yuma, where Bass ran a feed yard. Anna worked for the Arizona Beef Council. Now Bass runs the Pinal Feeding Company feed yard, and Anna works for the Arizona Cattlegrowers Association, at least until their oldest son Bass IV starts kindergarten next year.

Bass' grandmother gave them the brand 9F that had belonged to her father. It stands for the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit as defined in the Bible, Galatians 5:22-23.

Humor lets those around you know you are normal, and sometimes we simply take things too seriously.

Humor is a universal language that everyone

Appropriate humor does not come at the cost of individuals, it is not critical, it is not off-color, it does not embarrass, no dirty words, and it should not encourage inappropriate communication or behavior. Avoid politics, special interests, polarized opinions, religion, sex or anything that would make your audience uncomfortable.

Humor causes the teller to seem more selfassured. As long as a joke is appropriate, do not be afraid of a flop — or that not everyone thinks

For humor to be effective you must know your audience. Context is everything; the jokes you tell your audience are not the jokes you tell your best friend after having a couple drinks.

A minimal number of very short personal stories are fine. But only those stories with a point — specifically in context to your audience - or only those stories that make a humorous point should be shared.

Being an entrepreneur without really focusing on the fundamental things is like a day without sunshine — or in other words. you know, night (Steve Martin). Behind every successful entrepreneur is someone rolling their eyes (Jim Carrey).

Sometimes it is a fine line between confidence and conceit. Strong leaders know how to make the audience feel good about themselves. Strong leaders know it is about others' growth and opportunity. Let your audience know you are normal with a couple very short examples of how you are human, make mistakes, have fears.

When you arrive at the top and you are CEO, remember no one is too good to take out the garbage. 📭



Warming Up 101: The Essentials

What is warming up?

Warming up prepares the body for more intense movement and activity. It literally "warms up" the body by increasing core temperature.

A proper warm-up consists of movements

- Move joints through their full ranges of
- · Enhance mobility
- Release connective tissue bonds
- Distribute fluid in the joint space • Boost speed/force of muscle
- contractions
- Promote oxygen uptake

Why warming up is important

While age-related body changes and water loss can contribute to inflexibility, most of it comes down

to "use it or lose it." A proper warm-up helps counteract negative effects of aging while enhancing performance. Not warming up can lead to poor mobility/flexibility, injuries and stiffness.

Warm-up Types

Movements used during a warm-up might

- Movements intended to get the core temperature up and the whole body moving (e.g. brisk walking or light jogging while swinging the arms)
- Dynamic movements such as stretching while moving (e.g. walking lunges for

hip flexibility, or tipping your head side to side for neck mobility)

Foam rolling should be included before

the dynamic movements as part of a warm-up since it helps with mobility and breaks down scar tissue/ adhesions. This relaxes the fascia and makes muscle more pliable.

Flexibility, mobility and injury

Some consider the warm-up a time

to build flexibility and mobility. Flexibility is the capacity of a joint to move freely through a full range of motion. Mobility is our ability to produce a desired movement. Both are based on the elasticity of muscle, ligaments and connective tissues, but while poor mobility is correlated with injury, poor flexibility is not necessarily.

We want some areas to be more mobile but other areas to be more stable and strong. For most folks, this means it's important to

- Front of shoulders
- Ankles

• Front of hips and IT band

Hamstrings

• Thoracic spine

Tightness in these areas can contribute to tears and impingements.

Nearly 70 percent of the population will suffer from a shoulder disorder at some point in their lifetime — largely due to the inherent instability of the joint combined with the modern "rounded back" posture that pulls the shoulders forward and hunches the upper back.

While minimal flexibility is related to injury, performing static stretching (exclusively) during a warm-up doesn't seem to decrease injuries. And too much stretching and flexibility may even increase the rate of injury. Many people, in fact, suffer injuries caused by excessive movement and flexibility in the:

- Shoulder joint
- Knees (especially women)
- Cervical and lumbar spines

Summary and recommendations

Consider your warm-up period an essential part of the workout — not optional free time. It'll make you stronger and improve your body control, balance, movement mechanics and agility.

Most benefits of a warm-up come from actually warming up the body, which can be accomplished by 4 to 15 minutes of dynamic movements. Find a warm-up that makes your body feel the best, and one that you can stick with. 📮



Importance of Oral Hygiene

ral hygiene is essential to a person's overall health. "The simple acts of brushing and flossing are instilled in us so that we maintain our "pearly whites;" yet, oral health is much more than clean teeth; it involves the gums and their supporting tissues, the palate, the lining of the mouth and throat, the tongue, the lips, the salivary glands, the chewing muscles, the nerves, and the bones of the upper and lower jaws" (Benjamin, 2010). Good oral hygiene is important not only for social interactions with others, for a self-esteem aspect, but also imperative for heart health too. Let us explore how oral hygiene effects the body.

Diseased, crooked or missing teeth can interfere with speech; compromise the ability to chew food properly without difficulty and pain. Bacteria from improper oral care of the mouth will lead to infection in other parts of the body.

- "Heart disease Bacteria in the bloodstream can travel to the heart and lead to a heart attack.
- Endocarditis Bacteria may find its way to the inner linings of the heart and valves, which in turn, create growth pockets of bacteria. These pockets cause inflammation and infection of the inner linings of the heart.
- Stroke It is a belief that oral bacteria may be a contributing factor to the arteries narrowing as well as blood clots easily forming because of the body's negative response to the bacteria in the bloodstream.

- Inflammation Inflamed gums and bleeding may cause systemic inflammation.
- Rheumatoid Arthritis It is a known fact that periodontal disease will worsen the pain already suffered by those inflicted with this autoimmune disorder.
- Lung Condition Those already suffering from COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease) and pneumonia may have their condition worsened due to an increase of bacteria in their lungs from the lack of good oral hygiene" (Six health problems linked to bad oral hygiene, 2017).

For those who need a refresher, here is why oral health is so crucial: Every time you eat, food particles stick to your teeth. If you do not brush and floss daily, the particles attract bacteria and form a slimy coating on teeth called plaque. With less than a week of inattentiveness, plaque calcifies into hard tartar that does not come off without dental assistance, and begins to lodge into the gum line. Thus, the gums become inflamed (gingivitis) the first stage of periodontal (gum) disease; little pockets

open up between the teeth and the gums. Over time, the pockets get bigger, driven by festering bacteria that eat away at the tooth and its supporting architecture, eventually consuming it.

Prevention is always the best form of

- Establish daily brushing and flossing routines
- Dental check-ups every six months
- Avoid tobacco, high-sugar content foods and beverages



ost people, when faced with a life challenge, obscure their adversity and then hope to heavens it doesn't reveal itself. Others dig in and face the opposing force head on.

Maricopa High School senior Noah Salinas is without a doubt that second type.

Originally from Sterling, Colorado, Salinas, 18, was born missing the lower half of both legs along with his entire left hand, a condition referred to as tri-amelia. Such a condition can severely limit a person's ability to function, sometimes forcing them into a wheelchair and/or a life of assisted-living.

Arizona, Noah attended Williams Field High School in Higley and made the football team. Due to the coaches' attempts to shelter Noah, his mother said, he was never allowed to play in games.

Noah was the recipient of the national Sports Authority Courage Award in 2016.

His family decided to bring him out to Maricopa, where they hoped he would have a chance at playing. Again, he was not on the field much. But, like much of his life, he never really let that get him down.

"I guess they [football coaches] were afraid of me getting hurt," Salinas said. "I understand that."

With all the focus on football, he avoided the mat most of his high school career until his senior year, when he thought he'd give it one last try.

He finished with an almost even record at 16 wins and 18 losses in the 182-pound weight class, pinning six of those opponents and earning a respectable 85 points for his team throughout the season.

To give himself better purchase on the mat, Salinas removes his prosthetics when wrestling and instead dawns rubberized socks. Removing his prosthetics gives him another advantage as well.

He towers over most opponents when wearing his prosthetics, standing well over 6-feet tall. However, with his legs removed, he is slightly shorter than most of his opponents, making it more difficult to take him down.

"That makes it so they can't really get to me the same," Salinas said.

All athletic prowess aside, Salinas is an otherwise typical teenager, with concerns about girls and friends. But most importantly, Noah is looking

Hoping to follow in his father's footsteps, Salinas is considering a career in welding. And though he hardly ever wears his prosthetic hand because it causes discomfort, he has conceded when it comes to welding he will most likely have to have some sort of prosthetic.

Because of work, Salinas's family had to return to the Higley-Queen Creek area this year before school could finish. Fortunately for Salinas, he said, his close friend and fellow MHS wrestler Kevin McDill has a "really great" family who offered to let Noah stay through graduation.

Salinas plans to attend one of the community colleges in the area to receive the vocational training needed to become a professional welder.

He isn't afraid of any barriers he could face in the often rough-neck field of metal workers and welders. He simply plans to stay true to his philosophy.

"When somebody says, 'you can't do it,' and I do it anyways, it proves them wrong," Salinas said. "I like proving them wrong."

high school and made an impression on the wrestling mat.

For Salinas, nothing could be further from reality.

He became an athlete.

Before starting school, Salinas had no concept of being different. It didn't dawn on him until he showed up the first day of kindergarten and saw other kids without prosthetics.

He returned home that day and received a rather straight-forward explanation from his parents, one that evidently had a major effect on the way he would later approach life.

Soon after discovering this potentially constraining position in life, around age 5 or 6, he found surprising success at one of the activities few would imagine he could even attempt — wrestling.

Salinas was a natural athlete, according to his mother Amber, and he became interested in other sports, including the very physical game of football. A few years after playing in a few pick-up games with his cousins, Noah joined a youth team in Colorado.

When trying new, daunting tasks Salinas claimed to never make much of a consideration for his condition.

"I don't really think about it; I never really let it get to me," Salinas said. "I just kind of try it and go from there."

Others are not so capable of overlooking his prosthetics. For those people, Salinas has a special response.

"I would always just make jokes about myself," he said. "So they knew I didn't care and that I was going to do what I needed to do to be successful in life."

While growing up, Salinas switched back and forth periodically between football and wrestling. In 2015, after his family came to



But not all of us are here. There are some who gave up, who were overwhelmed. Even now, plenty of us are wondering what we will do, and how we will do it.



Parents wield influence on kids' alcohol, drug use

he Be Awesome Youth Coalition administers a community survey with Cenpatico Integrated Health every quarter to use current and relevant data to prevent youth substance abuse. Data from March 2017 showed us that parties, friends and home are common ways for teens to get drugs and alcohol.

Most common sources of drugs and alcohol:

- Party with friends, without adults present [alcohol, marijuana, prescription drugs]
- Someone age 21 or older who is not parent or guardian [alcohol]
- At home from parents or guardians [alcohol, prescription drugs]
 From someone at school [marijuana,
- prescription drugs]
 Hollywood would lead one to believe it is a

normal rite of passage for teens to use alcohol and other drugs at a party while parents are away.

The truth is, most teens aren't using drugs and alcohol. In fact, in Maricopa teen use is trending down.

Parents don't have to be passive bystanders while their kids experiment with chemicals that can lead to poor choices with life-altering consequences. Parents are the No. 1 influencer in their kids' lives and

should wield that influence.
So, what is a parent or guardian to do?

Be there. It's simple but profound. Family attachment is a key predictor in whether a child chooses to get drunk or high. Check in

Talk to your kids. Talk to them about drugs and alcohol, and why you want them to do something better. Explain the risks to

with your kids to let them know you care.

them. Listen to your kids and what they think about the issue.

Set clear limits on drug and alcohol use and hold them accountable. Let them know what the consequences are physically, legally and, of course, with you. Monitor the alcohol and prescription drugs in your home. Lock them up if you need to.

Know where your kids are going. Make it clear that parties with drugs and alcohol aren't acceptable.

Know the friends your kids are spending time with. Encourage them to get involved in activities where they will make healthy friendships, such as church youth groups, after-school service clubs, sports or the Be Awesome Youth Coalition.

Exercise outdoors for a change of scenery

Lacking motivation to get to the gym? It may be time to take your workout into Mother Nature; a playground of endless workout opportunities, free and open 24 hours per day.

A study published by *Environmental Science and Technology* found that people who exercise outdoors have higher energy levels, decreased tension and stress than people who only workout indoors.

So, if you spend a lot of time in your home, office, gym or car, getting a great workout with the sun beaming on you might be exactly what the doctor ordered to relieve stress.

Outdoor workouts are great for your mental health, but they also have amazing physical benefits. For example, hiking or walking on uneven terrain (like at a park or hiking trail) requires more body control and balance.

Here are some ideas for CrossFit exercises that you can do outdoors at one of our many lovely Maricopa parks.

Use Your Body Weight

Workout 1 (5 Rounds)

5 Pushups

10 sit ups

15 squats

Workout 2 (5 Rounds)

10 burpees (squat thrusts)

20 Bench Jumps

30 Pushups

40 squats

50 Lunges

Just Burpees

Do 100 burpees in as little time as possible. If you do this at full intensity, it should leave you short of breath. Experts in the CrossFit community agree burpees can be extremely taxing on the body when done repetitively.

According to health and wellness writer, Katherine Martinko, this movement, when done correctly, "will teach efficiency of movement, build explosiveness and develop that all-important 'engine' that keeps you going through a tough workout."

Play Ba

No gym, no problem! Use a variety of balls outside to get a total-body strength and cardio workout. Collect all the balls you have — basketballs, soccer balls or Swiss balls to create different drills. You can use them as weights or cones, or to do unstable pushups.

Get Creative

Playgrounds, parks and paths all have a myriad of equipment that is perfect for training. Try different bodyweight exercise like inverted rows, dips and pull-ups. Take along a resistance band to attach to a bar for a full-body workout.

Stairs are another excellent way to get exercise. It's the perfect outdoor workout because the intervals are built in. Add variety to target the different muscle groups. You can bound up every other stair, side step, high knees or even sprinting up the stairs like Rocky.

Fun Runs

Forget the treadmill and go on a fun run instead. Before you begin, decide on five or so bodyweight exercises (push-ups, burpees, lunges, etc.) and choose landmarks (park bench, red light, Amtrak Station) where you have to stop and do 10 reps of that move.

These outdoor workouts are just a few examples out of endless possibilities. Make your workouts fun and head outdoors to reap both the mental and physical benefits.

Library's Summer Reading Program 'builds a better world'

Maricopa Public Library wants to reach new heights with its Summer Reading Program.

The annual event is off and running, with programming for ages 0 to 17. With each book participants read, they will be building skyscrapers. The theme this year is "Build a Better World."

Library Manager Erik Surber said those who read 400 minutes during the program, which runs through July 14, will build the Empire State Building. Reading 800 minutes will build the Willis Tower (formerly Sears). And 1,200 minutes will equal Burj Khalifa.

"They can choose whatever challenge they think they're up to," Surber said. "If they are completed by July 14, they can win prizes."

Those include passes to UltraStar and Arizona State Parks.

He said if toddlers are read to or if children listen to audio books, it all counts. Older siblings reading to younger siblings counts for both.

"It's something to do over the summer, and they learn to set goals and pace themselves," Surber said.

The program also prevents the "summer slide" in learning so children don't fall months behind during vacation. Last year, 1,500 participated.

The Summer Reading Program is not just about reading. It is chockfull of entertainment and hands-on fun.

Events in June include a fire-and-ice science show, a magic show, a ventriloquist, live animals, puppet theater, fairytale princesses and, for the teens, T-shirt designing and anime. A hallmark event coming in July is the Cactus Brick LEGO build to match the theme.
