

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


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WELCOME TO MARICOPA

s Chairman of the Ak-Chin Indian Community, I would like to welcome you to our community and invite you and your family

Ak-Chin is an O'odham word translated to mean "mouth of ground." The Ak-Chin Indian Community has an

enrollment of more than 1,090 tribal members and a land base of just over 22,000 acres. We were formally organized in 1961, under the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934.

First and foremost, we are a farming community; Ak-Chin Farms was established in 1963 and currently harvests more than 15,000 acres, making us one of the largest farming communities in the United States. Cotton is the principal crop while barley, potatoes, alfalfa and corn are also grown. We are home to the Ak-Chin Him Dak Eco-Museum, the first of its kind in the country. The Him-Dak Eco-Museum is a place where

objects of our past, our culture and traditions are conserved and shared. Our local deli, Vekol Market, serves as a gas station and café that offers

a variety of options made fresh daily, a wide selection of groceries, a dining



area and a patio with outside seating.

Ak-Chin Southern Dunes Golf Club, located along Highway 238, provides a welcoming ambiance with breathtaking views. Ak-Chin Southern Dunes is perfect for the golf enthusiast but also offers delicious meals at the Arrovo Grille.

Ak-Chin Circle, entertainment for the entire family!

Harrah's Ak-Chin Casino offers 300 rooms and is currently undergoing the wash" or "place where the wash loses itself in the sand or a major renovation, adding more hotel rooms, conference/banquet space

> and restaurants. The bridge between Harrah's Ak-Chin and the UltraStar Multi-tainment Center will open this year and connect the two properties as part of the renovation. 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

MARICOPA'S RICH HISTORY



ince pre-Columbian times, Maricopa has had three distinct locations, each with its unique history. Prior to and during the early colonial period, native bands of the Akimel O'odham (Pima) and Pee-Posh

(Maricopa) lived in the Phoenix Valley around the Gila River. Relying on native trails and the "good-natured" tribes in the area, a stagecoach

connecting Tucson with Phoenix. Along that route just south of the Gila River, about eight miles northwest of the current city

limits, a relay station was built. Settlers called the stop Maricopa Wells after the O'odham word for the Pee-Posh people. A steady supply of fresh water made it a desert oasis fed by wells reaching

into the underground Gila River. When Arizona became a territory in 1863,

there were only three communities in the state with considerable size — Tucson, Prescott and Maricopa Wells.

Prior to the construction of the Southern Pacific Railroad, Maricopa Wells was a major supply post on the Transcontinental Mail Line and Butterfield Overland Stage Mail Line. Upon completion of the SPRR in 1879, the post was moved south to meet the tracks at its second home — Maricopaville — about 3.5 miles west of its current location.

Maricopaville suffered a short life, lasting route was established just west of Pima Butte only about seven years before being moved to its third and final locale. There were intentions to build a second rail line to connect Maricopaville to Phoenix (M&P Branch Line), but residents in Tempe became upset by the prospect of being excluded from access to the north-south line. In 1886, their noise eventually forced the M&P Branch terminus (Maricopa Junction) east to where the city of Maricopa is today.

In 1887, the first M&P train went into operation, and a year later the Maricopa post



Shortly after Maricopa found its new home, Maricopaville succumbed to the flames of a destructive fire, taking most of its buildings and homes, and sending its few inhabitants east to Maricopa Junction.

Over the next 35 years, Maricopa Junction experienced modest prosperity building churches, a hotel and schoolhouse.

In 1912, under President Taft, the federal government established the Ak-Chin Indian Community just south of Maricopa Junction. Less than a year later the federal government shrunk the reservation by half due to opposition from area farmers.

The population of Maricopa in 1920 was 381. In 1930, in the first year of the Great Depression, that number was reduced to 143. Later, in 1935, the M&P Line closed its doors, and, over the following decade, struggled with the effects of the Depression and then a war-time economy.

After World War II, the community began to again experience modest growth, even expanding the schoolhouse to accommodate the growing population. Over the next 60 years, some of the most well-known Maricopa families - Smiths, Farrells, Andersons and Burks — moved to the community and established their roots.

In 1995, State Route 347 was finished, paralleling the old M&P Branch Line. The City of Maricopa officially incorporated in 2003.

In less than 15 years, Maricopa's population grew from just over 1,000 to more than 43,000

Today, the population approaches 50,000.



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
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DID YOU KNOW?



JOHN WAYNE AKA THE DUKE

John Wayne was born Marion Morrison in Winterset, Iowa, grew up in Southern California and became a movie extra and then an actor after losing his scholarship to USC in the 1920s.



Wayne bought 4,000 acres of farmland between Maricopa and Stanfield in the late 1950s.

He partnered with local cotton farmer Louis Johnson, who managed Wayne's farm. The two soon merged their properties.

Wayne and Johnson moved into the cattle business in the 1960s. running a feedlot near Maricopa and a ranch near Springerville.

One of Wayne's favorite watering holes when he visited their farm was Table Top Tavern in Stanfield.

Johnson's wife Alice put Wayne on a weight-loss program for his movie

Wayne died of cancer in 1979.

El Dorado Holdings CEO Mike El Dorado Holdings CEU MIKE Ingram campaigned to have a portion of State Route 347 (Maricopa Road) named John Wayne Parkway.

> The Duke Golf Course draws its name from Wayne's nickname. Some streets within Rancho El Dorado share names with Wayne movies (Sagebrush Trail, Rio Grande, Rio Lobo, Cahill and others).







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TOP 10

FEATURES MARICOPANS LOVE ABOUT MARICOPA



InMaricopa.com asked readers what they enjoyed most about living in Maricopa. Below are the top 10 items in order of the frequency they were mentioned.

Neighborhoods - 16 percent of responses celebrated their neighborhoods for being "great" or "quiet" or simply possessing wonderful neighbors who look out for each other. "You can send out a Facebook post on Thanksgiving asking for condensed milk when all the stores are closed and get 50 offers of help from your neighbors," one reader wrote.

Community spirit - Mentioned in 13 percent of replies, the "we're all in this together" attitude tied for second. Maricopa was noted for coming together to celebrate great events and show support for others after tragedy. "I love how service-minded we are as a community," a reader wrote. "I love that our elected officials truly care about our community even if we don't always see eye-to-eye."

Friendliness - Also with 13 percent of mentions was how sociable and approachable many residents are. Though readers pointedly explained the friendliness did not always translate to social media, "real life" Maricopans were marked as cordial and welcoming.

Safety - Tied for fourth with 8 percent of the mentions was the feeling of safety for their children and the relative lack of serious crime. In various statewide studies during the year, Maricopa usually ranks among the top five safest cities

Cost of living - Though readers complained about utility costs, 8 percent still praised the affordability of living in Maricopa. That ranged from "cheaper housing" to local fees.



Small-town feel - Mentioned in various forms by 7 percent, a rural sensibility, lack of crowds (except during commuting hours) and the feeling of knowing many residents were high priorities.

No apartments – For those who feel apartment buildings equal crime – apparently about 7 percent of respondents – the fact there are not yet multifamily housing options is a plus, but there are signals that may soon change.

Starry nights - 4 percent of responses stated the ability to see the stars at night was a top enjoyment of living in Maricopa. Mother Nature pleased others with the desert weather in general.

Copper Sky - The city park was noted by another 4 percent for its indoor and outdoor venues, classes and events.

Business prospects - The same number also enjoyed contemplating the possibilities of new businesses and economic growth evident around town.

TRY THIS RECIPE HOT OFF THE GRILL!

NEW MEXICO GREEN CHILE CHEESEBURGER Combine ground beef salt cumin & ch



1 1/2 lb. ground beef, formed into (4) 1/3 lb. patties
1 tsp salt
1 tsp cumin
1 tsp chili powder
4 hatch or poblano chiles
1 medium yellow onion, cut into 3/4 slices
3 cloves garlic
3 tsp olive oil
4 burger buns
4 slices pepper jack cheese
Toppings of choice

Combine ground beef, salt, cumin, & chili powder. Mix with hands & form into four 1/3 lb. patties. Start Traeger grill on Smoke with lid open (4 to 5 mins). Set the temp to 350 °F and preheat, lid closed, for 10 mins. Toss garlic with I-1/2 tsp oil & pinch of salt & black pepper; seal in foil pouch. Brush onions with remaining I-1/2 tsp oil & sprinkle with salt & black pepper to taste. Grill whole chiles, onions and garlic for 15 mins, until chiles are blackened all over (turning every 5 mins), & onions are tender & grill-marked (turning them, & garlic pouch, after 7 or 8 mins). Place chiles in a bowl, cover with plate/plastic wrap & steam skins loose (10 mins). Peel & seed chiles, chop finely & transfer to medium bowl. Meanwhile, finely chop garlic & onions & add to chiles. The Electronic Health Record increases the hospital's quality outcomes leading to increased patient satisfaction, and enhances patient safety. One of the best indicators of this is the low rate of healthcare-associated infections, for which Banner Casa Grande ranks better than the state and national infection safety standards.

Recently, Banner Health expanded its TeleICU and TeleBehavioral services to Casa Grande. 017 turned out to be a great year for the residential housing market in Maricopa, with many positive trends. Sellers had reason to celebrate as the median price of homes saw a significant increase, from \$174,500 to \$190,000, or 8.9 percent, according to data from the Arizona Regional Multiple Listing Service (ARMLS). Additionally, sellers were able to get their asking prices in a relatively short amount of time — homes sold at an average of 98.5 percent of the listed price and the south side, which will likely change as well. in an average of 64 days on the market.

increases in price, as many Canadian landlords took advantage of a favorable exchange rate and decided to sell their homes in 2017. As of January 2018, there were only 40 homes for rent, with only one of those priced under \$1,000 per month, and a median price of \$1,200 per month.

However, a recently proposed item could have a big impact on these statistics. Last November, a developer presented a plan to the City Council for building multifamily structures in Maricopa. Because there are currently no

need for individuals seeking a 1-2 bedroom property, and would likely help keep rental prices from escalating further.

Additionally, the State Route 347 overpass will soon begin construction and is estimated to be completed in late 2019. Once finished, we will likely see greater parity in prices between the neighborhoods on the north side and south side of the tracks because of this added convenience. There are currently no new homes being built on

Unknown, however, is the impact on homes The residential rental market also saw during construction. Many residents on the south side of Maricopa commute north to the Phoenix area. So, if there are frequent road closures and inconvenient detours lasting for months at a time, it is possible homes south of the tracks could become less desirable and harder to sell until construction is completed.

While 2017 had lots of highlights for sellers, the 2018 outlook is also bright, with new homebuilders leading the way. At first glance, the current levels of inventory appear to be trending the wrong way. The supply of homes in MLS as apartments in Maricopa, this would help fill a of Jan. 15, 2018, was 454 listings, compared to

384 on the same date in 2017. However, upon closer look, it can be seen that over 20 percent of those listings are actually for new homes, either under construction or completed spec homes.

And several companies are set to open new model homes this year that have yet to list their homes in MLS, including Fulton Homes in Glennwilde, Costa Verde Homes in Santa Rosa Springs and Scott Communities in Sorrento. This will accompany the already-existing builders — KB Home, DR Horton, LGI Homes, Starlight Homes and Meritage Homes. Because there are still many shovel-ready improved lots throughout Maricopa, it is possible we could see even more builders break ground later this year. And as the new homes sell and builders raise their prices, resale prices are sure to follow suit. So buyers will be happy with additional inventory options and areas to choose from, while sellers can expect to enjoy steady increases


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

City park rules prohibit boating, swimming or wading in the water (by humans or pets). Glass containers and alcoholic beverages are also prohibited at Copper Sky Regional Park, unless otherwise indicated for a special event.

Pacana Park

From sunrise to 11 p.m., licensed anglers can find a diversely-stocked pond with a maximum depth of 11 feet. Depending on the season. AZGF keeps this lake stocked with a mixture of fish allowing for an individual daily-bag limit of two catfish, two trout, one bass (13-inch minimum), five sunfish and one white amur (30-inch minimum).

Huntina

Sonoran Desert National Monument

For Maricopa residents, one of the best places for a local hunt is less than an hour west of the city, in the mountains and valleys of the Sonoran Desert National Monument. While hunting is allowed on much of the nearly 500.000 acres of federally-protected land, it can be limited in certain areas and entirely prohibited in others depending on the species, season and method-of-take, so do vour research with the Arizona Game and Fish Department and Bureau of Land Management.

When properly licensed and permitted, hunters in the monument could have access to javelina, mule deer, mountain lions, dove and quail. Desert bighorn sheep are also known to live in the Maricopa Mountains. though due to dwindling populations, permits to hunt these illusive mammals have become harder to obtain, with only 80 to 100 being awarded in the state each year through the AZGFD's lottery system.

Public Shooting Areas

Maricopa Shooting Range Hidden Valley Road

Located on Hidden Valley Road, approximately 1.25 miles south of Farrell Road, is Maricopa's

closest public shooting area. Situated on the eastern slopes of the Palo Verde Mountains. this target-shooting area is open and free to shooters of all ages and types.

The secluded site is managed by the Bureau of Land Management, which requires target materials, ammunition casings and all other garbage be disposed of properly. Individuals caught littering may be prosecuted.



Sonoran Desert National Monument

Most of the Sonoran Desert Nation Monument is open for recreational shooting, with the exception of 10,600 acres in the north and northeastern areas that in 2015 was closed to target shooting because of a "court-ordered analysis of the impacts of such shooting on the Monument." The prohibited areas amount to only about 2 percent of the total monument.

The Bureau of Land Management advises all shooters to follow safety guidelines, and only use firearms as prescribed by federal and state law. The BLM also requires target materials, ammunition casings and all other garbage be disposed of properly.

Camping & Hiking

Hiking and camping is allowed throughout most of the monument. With nearly 500,000 acres of federally-protected lands, SDNM can entertain novice hikers and adventurous explorers alike. From short, scenic hikes and wildlife viewing, to overnight camping and

stargazing, BLM encourages people to explore the numerous hidden treasures of both indigenous and colonial history. BLM advises all visitors to follow park

regulations concerning the use of open flame and trash disposal. During the hotter months, April to September, BLM reminds hikers to stay hydrated and always bring a cellular phone in case of emergencies. It is also important to notify someone of the location of your intended hike.

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


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



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BUSINESS LICENSE APPLICATION PROCESS

tarting a business in a new community can often prove daunting. As with most communities, there are a few things you need to line up before setting up shop in Maricopa; most importantly, securing a business license.

To operate within city limits, all businesses must have an official City of Maricopa business license. The digital-application process takes about a week.

Abiding by the following three steps can help ensure a smooth application process.





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Determine what classification your business falls in

The City of Maricopa offers five types of licenses — Commercial, Home-Based, Solicitor/Peddler, Out-of-Town and Special-Use.

The base fee for a license is \$50 annually, prorated by about \$4.15 per month after the December deadline down to a minimum of \$25.

In addition to the base licensing fee, businesses that sell beer, wine or other "spirituous liquors" must pay an annual fee of \$100. Additional fees for "Special-Use" business licenses also apply as indicated in the application.

Gather required documentation

Documents that may be required include:

 Tax documents, including Federal Employer ID Number and Arizona Transaction Privilege Tax License.

- · Arizona State Contractor's License.
- Certificate of Good Standing from Arizona Corporation Commission or Secretary of State.
- Trade name certificate.
- Sign permit.
- Pinal County health card.
- Work eligibility documentation such as a U.S. birth certificate, passport and naturalization or citizenship certificates.

It is best to have all necessary tax and work eligibility documents up to date and ready to go.

Applications can only be submitted online at CI-Maricopa-AZ. SmartGovcommunity.com.

*All Special-Use license applicants must be fingerprinted by the Maricopa Police Department and undergo a background check, which could take up to eight weeks to process. Fingerprinting is done at MPD, 39675 W. Civic

*Additional building permitting and health inspections may be required.
